Our Preschool Director Lindsey Walker and the rest of the staff are second to none.

We have had many great events and times together. I have especially fond memories of the two years we had "Wednesdays in the Park" as well as the Food Pantry "Stock the Shelves" Bluegrass and BBQ events which not only helped the pantry but brought together the Red Bank community. Eggstravaganza and our Hanging of the Greens Services and festivities have provided us with a great opportunity to mingle and worship with our preschool families and our Trunk-Or-Treat events have brought over seven hundred community members into our building two years in a row.

As many of you know I do most of our promotions for church events and the food pantry on our many local public community Facebook pages. And I have seen people write over and over again things like: "If I were to go to church I would go to Red Bank United Methodist Church," and "Red Bank United Methodist Church is doing what churches are supposed to do," and they see you all, month after month, putting your faith into action. It is my opinion that within the minds of our unchurched neighbors, RBUMC has the best reputation and is the most respected church in town. With this foundation, I have no doubt you have an amazing future ahead as you prepare to welcome Reverend Elizabeth Hamilton and her wonderful family.

If you are as blessed as I am, you meet some amazing people along the way. The respect I have for you all, the things I've learned, the good times we have had, the life experiences, doing ministry side by side has been priceless. You people are amazing. It's been a very good run. This is my favorite church yet. I'm sad, but I know God has great things in store for us all. I want you to know I love you. Thank you for being you!

#### A Conversation with Pastor Liz

I am excited for Liz and for the congregation of Red Bank UMC. This is going to be a wonderful time for this church. Liz is originally from Greenville, Tennessee, and her husband Matt grew up in Petersburgh, Florida. They love to teach the Bible together and plan to do that on Wednesday nights. Liz says it's a lot of fun because they have different views on things and like to bounce their ideas off one another.

On Wednesday, May 15, I had the opportunity to sit down with Reverend Hamilton and ask her some low-key fun facts. The following is the short interview.

#### Where did you go to school?

**Rev. Hamilton:** I went to East Tennessee State for my undergraduate degree and then Asbury Theological Seminary in Wilmore, Kentucky where I received a Master's Degree in Divinity.

#### What other churches have you served?

**Rev. Hamilton:** I was the Associate Pastor at Abington United Methodist Church, and then I was the Senior Pastor of Addilynn Memorial United Methodist Church in Bristol. My last appointment was at Mountain View United Methodist Church in Kingsport.

#### Tell me about your family.

**Rev. Hamilton:** My husband Matt and I have been married for 14 years. We met at Asbury Seminary where Matt received a Master of Biblical Studies. Currently, Matt works remotely for Johnson City Toyota.

My oldest child Jordan is going to turn 13 this summer and he will be entering the 8<sup>th</sup> grade. He loves bowling and plays the tuba.

My other son Isaac will turn 7 this summer and he will be entering the 2<sup>nd</sup> grade. He likes dragons, monsters, Zelda, and Minecraft.

#### What is your favorite thing about being a Pastor?

**Rev. Hamilton:** My favorite thing is meeting new and different people and forming relationships with them.

## What is your favorite Bible verse?

**Rev. Hamilton:** Joshua 1:6-8 so it's more than one verse.: "Be strong and courageous, because you will lead these people to inherit the land I swore to their ancestors to give them. Be strong and very courageous. Be careful to obey all the law my servant Moses

gave you; do not turn from it to the right or to the left, that you may be successful wherever you go. Keep this Book of the Law always on your lips; meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do everything written in it. Then you will be prosperous and successful." These verses stand out to me because Joshua had something so difficult in front of him. Moses had died, and these are the words God keeps before him and it gives him courage, hope, and strength.

# What are some of your preaching plans?

**Rev. Hamilton:** I'm going to kick things off with a series from the Old Testament entitled "Walking in the Footsteps of the Prophets." I've been working on it for several months and have a lot of ideas written down. I like the prophets because they had a difficult job. They had to bring hard messages to the people and the people hated them for it.

## What excites you most about Red Bank United Methodist Church?

**Rev. Hamilton:** The food pantry. It tells me so much about the congregation, their heart, and their willingness to serve.

#### What's your favorite kind of music?

**Rev. Hamilton:** I like all kinds of music. I've been on a Bluegrass kick lately, but I listen to all kinds of stuff, pop, rock, you name it.

# What dreams do you have for Red Bank United Methodist Church?

**Rev. Hamilton:** I dream of growth—not just numerical but spiritual growth because when you grow spiritually in your walk with Jesus Christ people notice.

# What is your favorite sport?

**Rev. Hamilton:** We are all Tennessee football fans.

#### Favorite food?

Rev. Hamilton: Pizza.
