

The Season is Upon Us

"The celebration of Advent is possible only to those who are troubled in soul, who know themselves to be poor and imperfect, and who look forward to something greater to come." --Dietrich Bonhoeffer

Some of us may know that the Advent season focuses on expectation and think that it serves as an anticipation of Christ's birth in the season leading up to Christmas. This is part of the story, but there is more to Advent.

Advent symbolizes our present situation as the Church in these "last days (see Acts 2:17 and Hebrews 1:2), as we wait for the return of Christ in glory to consummate His eternal kingdom. We, the Church, are in a similar situation to Israel at the end of the Old Testament: in exile, waiting and hoping in prayerful expectation for the coming of the Messiah. Israel looked back to God's past grace-filled actions on their behalf in leading them out of Egypt in the Exodus, and on that basis, they called for God to once again act for them. In the same way, we the Church, during Advent, look back upon Christ's coming into our world in celebration while at the same time looking forward in eager anticipation to the coming of Christ's kingdom when He returns. In light of this, the Advent hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" represents our cry during the Advent season:

"O come, O come, Emmanuel, And ransom captive Israel, That mourns in lonely exile here Until the Son of God appears. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel."

While Israel would have sung this song in expectation of Christ's first coming, we now sing the song in commemoration of that first coming and in expectation of the second coming in the future.

While it is difficult to keep all this in mind in the midst of holiday celebrations, shopping, lights and decorations Advent is meant to be a season when we reflect on the violence and evil in the world which causes us to cry out to God to make things right—to put death's darkness to flight. Our exile in the present makes us look forward to our future Exodus. And our own sinfulness and need for grace lead us to pray for the Holy Spirit to renew God's work in conforming us into the image of Christ.

And so, while Advent is certainly a time of celebration and anticipation of Christ's birth, it is more than that. It is only in the shadow of Advent that the miracle of Christmas can be fully understood and appreciated, and it is only in the light of Christmas that the Christian life makes any sense. We are living in the in-between time: the time of the fulfilled promise of Christ's first coming and the yet-to-be-fulfilled promise of His second coming. The promise for Israel and the promise for the Church is Jesus Christ; He has come and He will come again. This is what Advent is about.
